Does the VA provide any special burial benefits to veterans? My dad, who has late-stage Parkinson's disease, served during the Vietnam War in the 1960s.

Most U.S. veterans are eligible for burial and memorial benefits through the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) National Cemetery Administration. Veterans who were discharged are eligible, unless the discharge was under dishonorable conditions. To verify your dad's discharge, you will need a copy of his DD Form 214 "Certificate of Release or Discharge from Active Duty," which you can request online at *Archives.gov/veterans*.

Here is a rundown of some of the different benefits that are available to veterans who pass away from a nonservice-related cause.

National Cemetery Benefits

If your dad is eligible, and would like to be laid to rest in one of the 136 national or 111 grant-funded state and tribal VA cemeteries (see www.cem.va.gov/cem/cems/listcem.asp for a list), the VA provides a host of benefits at no cost to the family, including: a gravesite, opening and closing of the grave, perpetual gravesite care, a government headstone or marker, a United States burial flag that can be used to drape over the casket or accompany the urn (after the funeral service, the flag is given to the next-of-kin as a keepsake) and a presidential memorial certificate.

National cemetery burial benefits are also available to spouses and dependents of veterans. Note that, if your dad is cremated, his remains will be buried or inurned in the same manner as casketed remains.

Funeral or cremation arrangements and costs are not, however, taken care of by the VA. They are the responsibility of the veteran's family. Some veterans' survivors are eligible for burial allowances, which are explained below.

If you are interested in this option, the VA offers a pre-need burial eligibility determination program at www.cem.va.gov/pre-need. You can also call the National Cemetery Scheduling Office at 800-535-1117.

Private Cemetery Benefits

If your dad wants to be laid to rest in a private cemetery, the benefits available include a free government headstone or marker, or a medallion that can be affixed to an existing privately purchased headstone or marker, a burial flag and a presidential memorial certificate.

Funeral or cremation arrangements and costs are the responsibility of the family (some burial allowances may be available). Benefits are not available for spouses and dependents buried in private cemeteries.

Military Funeral Honors

Another popular benefit available to eligible veterans buried in either a national or private cemetery is a military funeral honors ceremony. This includes an honor guard detail of at least two uniformed military persons, folding and presenting the U.S. burial flag to the veteran's survivors and the playing of Taps by a bugler or an electronic recording.

The funeral provider you choose will be able to assist you with all VA burial requests. Depending on what is desired, certain forms may need to be completed. For a complete rundown of burial and memorial benefits, eligibility details and required forms, visit www.cem.va.gov or call 800-827-1000.

Burial Allowances

In addition to the burial benefits, some veterans' survivors may also qualify for a \$300 burial allowance (or \$780 if hospitalized by the VA at the time of death). For those who choose to be laid to rest in a private cemetery, a \$780 allowance may be available to the veterans' survivors. To find out if your dad is eligible, see *Benefits.va.gov/benefits/factsheets/burials/burial.pdf*.

When the time comes to apply for burial allowances, you will need to fill out VA Form 21P-530 "Application for Burial Benefits." You will need to attach a copy of your dad's discharge document (DD 214 or equivalent), death certificate, funeral and burial bills. You may download this form at VA.gov/vaforms.

Sun City Elks Remember The Spouse Of A Veteran



As so often happens, with the Sun City Elks, a veteran, or in this case his spouse, is in need of assistance and Sun City Elks Veterans committee is quick to respond.

The latest call for assistance came from Boyd Smith, just an average individual, who believes in helping others, only in this case, Boyd is not exactly average.

Boyd, is an individual that the Sun City Elks had helped a few months earlier.

Boyd was born without his left arm and his right arm is only a stub, also he has one good leg and the other is also a stub.

The Sun City Elks Veterans Committee met Boyd at the Southwest Mobility Store in Sun City, while he was shopping for a motorized vehicle, for obvious reasons. Boyd had little money and was negotiating for a used chair.

Enter the Sun City Elks. The Elks Were visiting the store as "Southwest Mobility" partners with the committee in repairing motorized chairs for veterans. Southwest repairs the c hairs at no expense to the Sun City Committee, or the Vet. All that required payment was the material. Boyd's story became even more complex a few years ago, when he found his home ingulfed in flame. His entire family escaped the flames, but his granddaughter was nowhere in sight. Thinking she was still inside, Boyd' with his limited abilities, rushed inside to find her. She was

not inside, she had escaped, but was not readily seen. Boyd however, suffered sever burns to his good leg and face, but still considered himself blessed. His granddaughter was safe.

That is Boyd's personal story, but it continues to his neighborhood. While walking his dog about his neighborhood in his "new" Elks provided motorized wheelchair, Boyd happened to pass a neighbor's house and stopped to visit.

The neighbor, John Gloski, a 90 year old WW11 navy veteran, was distressed because his wife, 89 year old, Mary Gloski, could barely walk and was mostly confined to her home.

Knowing of the assistance that the Sun City Elks provides the Vets, Boyd called Gary Drumheller, the Elks Veterans chairman, and asked if they could be of assistance, of a motorized power wheel chair, he even offered to pay for the chair himself.

It only took about one week, when one of the Elk members donated a motorized chair.

After repairing and upgrading the chair, the Elks Committee delivered it to Mary.

John Gloski was aware of the gift, but his wife Mary was not.

When Mary was presented, with the chair, she burst into tears, thanking the Elks profusely.

At this time of year, when charity reigns most high, it is good to help your fellow man, to see the joy your good deeds have provided and to dwell in the knowledge of the blessings you know will eventually come your way for your thoughtfulness.



clothes dryer, microwave oven, TV, dish washer, bedding and dozens of items of clothing. When installing the appliances it was discovered that there were not enough electrical outlets to accommodate all that was delivered. Problem solved, a certified electrician was notified and will provide the required amenities.

To make the day even more complete, the family was given a Christmas tree complete with the required ornaments, 2, \$100 Visa gift cards, \$150 in Wallmart gift cards and \$110 in cash, tips donated by the band "Boomerang", that played at the Elks Lodge the previous knight.

It is said that,"the Lord works in mysterious ways". That was the case with the Garcia family.

Frank was observed trying to get donations at a recent car show, a minister, Pastor Horace Carter, noticed Frank and referred him to another individual that could possibly assist him. That individual, a "learning" minister, Pastor George Calderon, leader of the Soldiers

for Christ" church, in Avondale, Az., notified Mr. Dave Wimmer, director of the "Veterans for Veterans, Women and Children" organization, who in turn, notified Sun City Elks Lodge #2559, who work closely with Dave to assist our Veterans.

When notified of the purpose of the visit, Frank stated that," he was speechless, he did not know what to say". His wife, Vanessa, said nothing, she just cried. Tears of joy, of course.

At this time of year, when giving is the norm, several people and organizations, joined together to assist their fellow man and to "bring cheer" to a family, who's father, had recently told his family, that there would be no Christmas this year as they had no money.

The "Lord" does indeed work in mysterious ways.
