"Ajo #1576 Honors Citizen of the Year Part 1"

I would like to introduce to the recipient of the 2025 Ajo Elks Lodge, Citizen of the Year Award, Mr. Ken Farmer.

Many of you already know Kenny as a longtime resident of Ajo but some of you may not, so with Kennys permission, let's take a stroll down memory lane. Kenny was born in Ajo at the Phelps-Dodge mine hospital, up on the hill, in 1948. He attended elementary school at the Curley Elementary School and graduated from Ajo High School in 1966.

After high school he attended and graduated from Northern Arizona University, in Flagstaff, with a degree in Elementary Education. He returned to his hometown here in Ajo and began his teaching career that would last for 38 years. During his career in the Ajo Public School system, Kenny coached Freshman, JV and Varsity football and Volleyball and as well as coach of Ajo High School Golf team. He was the Ajo High School Athletic Director for 6 years.

During his tenure as an educator Kenny not only taught his students reading, writing and arithmetic but the equally important things such as right from wrong, being a good person and being responsible and for your actions.

His students were mentored not only by a great educator but by a good man. There are hundreds of his students who went on to attend college and vocational schools and become wonderful mothers and fathers because of the good teachings and guidance of this man.

Aside from his school activities he has served in multiple capacities at the Ajo Country Club, and been an indispensable part of the annual Christmas celebration. I

know Kenny is still greeted by the familiar, "Hey Mr. Farmer, how are you" by thousands of students who have returned to Ajo every Christmas to spend the holidays.

Currently he serves as a board member of the Ajo Cemetery Association and I'd like to focus a little on his work there.

He has been a Board Member for approximately 5 years and has been instrumental in the revitalization efforts to maintain and care for the Ajo Cemetery. His unceasing dedication, long hours of physical labor and coordination with the community in providing a place of eternal rest for the members of the Ajo community speaks for itself.

Mr. Farmer, along with other Board Members were directly responsible for the transfer of the Ajo Vietnam Memorial from the VFW to the Ajo Cemetery and the establishment of that memorial as one of the center pieces in the memory of those veterans that made the ultimate sacrifice for our country. One of the key roles of Mr. Farmer at the cemetery, is the coordination with family members for the final resting place of their loved ones. Mr. Farmer, on very short notice many times, meets with grieving family members and accommodates their requests. His ability as a kind, caring and considerate person has not gone unnoticed by countless families over the years. The role he plays at the cemetery may seem simple; however, his many acts of kindness speak volumes about him as a person and community member. It is his work at the Ajo Cemetery that this award is specific to.

Over the years, Ajo has been fortunate to have citizens that step forward to accept the responsibilities that others have refused, stepped forward to sacrifice their time, their money and their precious family time and do the things that need to be done to make Ajo, Arizona a better place. Reporting is easier with a Coordinator By Myron T. Shannon, Jr. Committee Member

With the Elks year over, we need to be on top of our charitable reporting. We might never reach that 100% level, but we can do better than we have done in the past.

One way of capturing the charitable works that our Members achieve is to appoint a Government Relations Lodge Coordinator. The Secretary will give this person access to CLMS for recording charitable giving. They will only have access to charitable giving and will not be able to access any other part of CLMS. By doing this we will have two people capturing and reporting our giving.

You should have the Government Relations Manual at your Lodge. This book will give all the information you need. On page 19 you will find Appendix 8, which is the form you need for reporting. Make copies and make them available for Members so they can fill them out and return them to the Government Relations Coordinator of your Lodge or the Secretary.

Let's make sure we keep the Lodge Government Relations Coordinator very busy so that we can surpass last year's totals.

As an example, the Hoop Shoot has thousands of hours and miles for capturing and reporting, when counting Lodge, district, state, regional, and the National Finals in Chicago.

VA processes one million disability claims faster than ever before

Department claims-processing productivity is at record levels

WASHINGTON — The Department of Veterans Affairs announced today it has processed more than a million disability claims in Fiscal Year 2025, reaching the milestone nearly two weeks faster than it did in FY24.

Despite receiving 15.6% more claims than last year, the department completed its one millionth FY25 claim Feb. 20 — faster than at any point in the department's history.

In fact, the 10 highest claims processing days in VA's history occurred within the last month, and the department's highest claims processing day ever was Feb. 12, when VA processed more than 12,000 claims.

Of the more than one million claims VA has processed in FY25, over 60% were granted.

Through January, VA has provided \$62 billion in compensation and pension benefit payments to 6.9 million Veterans and survivors. VA's claims accuracy rate has risen to more than 92%. To date, VA has completed 375,961 PACT claims in FY25.

"Under the leadership of President Trump, we are strengthening the department so it works better for Veterans, families, caregivers and survivors," said **VA Secretary Doug Collins**. "VA's claims processing productivity is the highest it has ever been, and we look forward to continuing to provide record levels of service to Veterans and VA beneficiaries."
